## **National Women's History Month**



Women's History Month began as a local celebration in Santa Rosa. California. The Education Task Force of the Sonoma County Commission on the Status of Women planned and executed a "Women's History Week" celebration in 1978. The organizers selected the week of March 8 to correspond with International Women's Day. The movement spread across the country as other communities initiated their own Women's History Week celebrations the following year.

In 1980, a consortium of women's groups and historians led by the National Women's History Project (now the National Women's History Alliance) successfully lobbied for national recognition. In February 1980, President Jimmy Carter issued the first Presidential Proclamation declaring the Week of March 8th 1980 as National Women's History Week.

## **Enola Gay Tibbits**



We honor Enola Gay Tibbits, the mother of military pilot Colonel (later General) Paul Tibbets, who was the pilot of the "Enola Gay". She asked her son, "why did you name the airplane Enola Gay?" He told her, "I knew the airplane was going to be famous...nobody ever heard the name Enola Gay before that."

As many of you know, The "Enola Gay" was the notorious Boeing B-

29 Superfortress Bomber that was chosen to drop the world's first atomic bomb on Hiroshima, Japan on August 6<sup>th</sup>, 1945. The crew of the Enola Gay could only guess what the mission might be, but were not told what the weapon in its bomb bay was. Special Mission No. 13 would drop the first "gadget" (military name for the bomb) as ordered in their Mission.



While I do not condone the bombing and related killing of innocent humans, as there is no morality in warfare, I must bring into view

the current Administration's actions, which I also do not condone and vehemently protest.

#### The Latest

All references to the Enola Gay aircraft that dropped an atomic bomb on Japan during World War II have been flagged for removal in Pentagon documents as the Department of Defense purges references related to diversity, equity and inclusion, or DEI – in this case, presumably because of the word "gay." Gay is also a female name, as well as a dated descriptive word for "happy, cheery, merry, jolly, lighthearted and jovial".

The granddaughter of General Tibbets in a recent interview called the Trump administration flagging photos of the plane for removal "shameful". She was shocked and in disbelief when she first heard photos of her grandfather's aircraft had been flagged by the U.S. Department of Defense, apparently only because its name contained the word "gay". "It's shameful that a word that harms no one, that means cheerful, could invoke so much hatred." The information purge also includes removal of language related to social wellness, racial equity and feminism. Thousands of photos, including many of women and minorities in the military, were also flagged for removal.

It is a disgrace that this is happening and a slap in the face of every veteran whose accomplishments, merits and bravery are being erased from the National Archives and Records Administration. I am honoring Enola Gay Tibbets, a mother like myself, who worried with anguish her son's mission and whether she would ever see him again. Her son, Paul, who honored and adored his mother so much that he had his mother's name painted on the famed aircraft he piloted on this infamous mission that is imbedded in our American military history. Just like so many military mothers who have for decades, year after year, have and continue to worry with anguish every time they have had to say goodbye to their children as they dawn the military uniforms and leave their homes.

## **ReCoverCA Program**



The California Department of Housing and Community Development has announced that applications for its 2020 and 2021 ReCoverCA Housing Programs will close on April 15, 2025.

ReCoverCA's 2020 Owner-Occupied Rehabilitation and Reconstruction (OOR) and 2021 Single-Family Reconstruction (SFR) Programs offer eligible single-family homeowners grants of up to \$500,000 to rebuild homes damaged or destroyed in qualifying 2020 and 2021 disasters.

Eligible ReCoverCA Housing Program counties are Butte, Fresno, Los Angeles, Napa, Plumas, Santa Cruz, Shasta, Siskiyou, Solano, and Sonoma.

ReCoverCA 2020 and 2021 Housing Programs are available to eligible homeowners making up to 120% of area median income. ## Consumer tip: Watch out for these job offer scams

Ever received a text about an easy high-paying job you never applied for? If so, you're not alone. These fraudsters promise remote work and big paychecks, but they're really after your money and personal information.

Employment scammers may send you a check after they have "employed" you, supposedly to buy equipment or pay bills. Then,

once you have sent them money, the check will bounce and it will be hard to recover your losses. Some fraudsters pose as real companies, using nearly identical email addresses to deceive you.

Avoid job offers with vague descriptions, upfront payment demands or interviews conducted through messaging apps. If something feels off, research the company's background, double-check email addresses and never send money or personal information without verifying first. If you suspect a job offer from a reputable business is fake, contact the company directly through a verified website or phone number to confirm its legitimacy.

## Share Your Thoughts on Plan Bay Area 2050+ Implementation Priorities



Following the <u>adoption of</u> <u>the Plan Bay Area 2050+</u> <u>Final Blueprint</u> in January 2025, staff from the Metropolitan Transportation

Commission (MTC) and the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) are drafting near-term implementation actions that will advance Plan Bay Area 2050+ strategies (including recommendations from the parallel <u>Transit 2050+</u> effort) through the year 2030.

These preliminary action ideas are largely compiled from brainstorming sessions held with partners and stakeholders last year and require further refinement between now and this summer. Staff provided an <u>update to the MTC Policy Advisory Council</u> at their February 2025 meeting laying out a timeline for developing Plan Bay Area 2050+ implementation actions, including opportunities for further engagement.

To that end, we invite you to participate in a comprehensive survey to help propose and prioritize preliminary draft implementation actions for Plan Bay Area 2050+. This survey and associated feedback will inform the Draft Implementation Plan, which will be released for public comment along with the Plan Bay Area 2050+ Draft Plan and Draft Environmental Impact Report this summer. Following public comment, additional feedback will be integrated prior to Final Plan adoption in early 2026.

Your early-stage input will shape the Implementation Plan so that it reflects partner priorities from across the region. Your unique subject matter expertise will be crucial to developing an ambitious yet achievable Implementation Plan so we can effectively advance the long-range plan's vision over the next several years.

### What to Know Before You Take the Survey

The survey offers a "choose-your-own-adventure" approach to providing input on any and all of the four plan elements – Transportation, Housing, Economy and Environment. If you plan to provide input on more than a few strategies, be sure to set aside sufficient time to complete the survey.

To help contextualize the questions in the survey, staff have prepared a short <u>explainer video</u>. Links to relevant reference documents are included to provide further context where appropriate.

## 56-Hour Closures scheduled to begin in March for Rio Vista Bridge



From a Caltrans press release:

Caltrans is advising motorists of six scheduled weekend closures of the Rio Vista Bridge (Helen Madere Memorial Bridge)

on State Route 12 (SR 12) for ongoing repairs.

This \$27.2 million project is funded through the Bridge Rehabilitation and Replacement Program and will require multiple 56-hour weekend closures for the work to be completed because of the limited width of the bridge to allow for heavy equipment access.

The project is making necessary mechanical repairs, replacing the movable deck span and replacing bridge rails.

During the weekend closures that are scheduled between March and June, the contractor will replace the movable span bridge deck concrete, and 60 steel stringers needed to extend the service life of the bridge.

Due to the limited width of the exiting bridge deck, 56-hour weekend bridge closures are necessary to facilitate safe access to the work for contractor and Caltrans personnel.

The 56-hour weekend bridge closure schedule will lessen total project workdays and help avoid the wait times at peak commute hours during the week.

Motorists could encounter additional travel times of up to two hours using detours from Rio Vista to Sacramento County on SR 12 across the Sacramento River. Please allow for extra travel time to reach your destination, especially for scheduled appointments and work schedules.



## Westbound I-80 Express Lane Opens as Temporary HOV Lane Ahead of Formal Launch in Late 2025



From a Caltrans press release:

The future westbound Interstate 80 (I-80) express lane running between Vacaville and Fairfield is now temporarily open to High-Occupancy Vehicle (HOV) traffic as of Saturday, March 8.

Roadway construction on the new express lane is ongoing and electronics and hardware for collecting tolls are still being installed. In the meantime, this lane is available to vehicles with two or more people on board weekdays from 5:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. During non-weekday commute hours, the lane is open to all motorists.

The new temporary HOV lane runs on westbound I-80 from the Interstate 505 interchange in Vacaville to Airbase Parkway in Fairfield.

As work is still in progress, Caltrans asks motorists to be mindful of their speed for the safety of our workers. Caltrans and its transportation partners expect to formally launch the completed express lane by late 2025. At that time, motorists using the new traffic lane will be charged as appropriate.

# Extended 79-hour closure for Eastbound U.S. Highway 50 in Yolo County postponed due to weather



From a Caltrans press release:

Caltrans is alerting motorists that this weekend's extended connector closure for the ongoing Yolo Interstate 80 (I-80) and U.S. Highway 50 (US-50) Pavement Rehabilitation Project has been postponed because of the weather

forecast for rain and cold temperatures. The work has not been rescheduled.

• 8 p.m. Monday, March 17 through 6 a.m. Tuesday, March 18 (weather permitting)

The work zone is west of the Yolo Causeway along I-80 and US-50 in West Sacramento. The speed limit has been reduced to 55 miles per hour 24/7 for the safety of workers and motorists. Work is scheduled to begin as listed but is subject to change due to traffic incidents, weather conditions, availability of equipment and/or materials, and construction-related issues.

This \$280 million project includes \$47 million from Senate Bill (SB 1), the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017. SB 1 provides \$5 billion in transportation funding annually, shared equally between state and local agencies. Road projects progress through construction phases more quickly based on the availability of SB 1 funds, including projects partially funded by SB 1. ## Suisun Marsh Watershed Education Program Reaches Nearly 1,700 Students in its 17th Year



From a Solano Resource Conservation District press release:

The Solano Resource Conservation District (SRCD) finished its seventeenth year of the Suisun Marsh Watershed Education Program last week. This year, they reached 1,698 Solano County sixth-grade students from 13 schools across the county. Solano RCD hosted 26 field trips at Rush Ranch Open Space, a Solano Land Trust property, where students explored the Suisun Marsh and learned how to be good stewards of this unique ecosystem.

The goal of the program is to help students better understand their watershed and how to protect it, using the unique outdoor laboratory of the Suisun Marsh as a focal point. Participants learn about the importance of the marsh ecosystem and the benefits it provides through three classroom lessons taught by Solano RCD staff and a field trip at Rush Ranch. Further, students explore the impact of human activities on the marsh and discuss how they can help lessen that impact.

Classroom lessons include an examination of a 3-D model of a watershed and topographic maps to illustrate how pollution in runoff can affect local bodies of water, such as the Suisun Marsh and the Sacramento River. Students gain an appreciation of the fact that preventing pollution in our local waterways is connected to efforts globally to prevent pollution in oceans. Another focus of the classroom lessons is helping students understand how they can be stewards of their water resources and prepare for drought in California. Students this year reported back after the program that they have a greater appreciation for water – including where their drinking water comes from and the importance of conserving it.

The highlight of the program is always the field trip out to Rush Ranch Open Space near Suisun City. One Solano County teacher noted that the program is "able to mix a science lesson with fun." The curriculum includes hands-on activities that meet California's Next Generation Science Standards. Students collect data from water tests that is submitted to a team at the National Estuarine Research Reserve, and they learn how to identify plants in the grassland and wetland habitats. The program also incorporates elements of the BEETLES curriculum, a program of the Lawrence Hall of Science at the University of California, Berkeley, which focuses on student-centered learning practices for outdoor settings.

"I just love seeing the kids out there, and I enjoy introducing students to something that's new in a safe and supportive environment," said Stephanie Stock, Assistant Program Manager at Solano RCD. She noted that many students want to come back to Rush Ranch with their families after they participate in the program, illustrating the positive impact the experience has on them.

Solano RCD's field trips provide much needed time in the outdoors for young people. Many students appreciate the peaceful atmosphere at the Suisun Marsh, further inspiring them to protect this important place here in Solano County.

This program is made possible with funding from the Solano County Water Agency, Solano County Department of Resource Management, Fairfield-Suisun Sewer District, Vallejo Flood and Wastewater District, Vacaville Public Education Foundation, and the Solano County Orderly Growth Committee.

It is uncertain at this time if programs will be funded at the same level next year, meaning fewer students will have the unique opportunity provided by the Suisun Marsh Watershed Education Program. ## Solano Community College Intercampus Vanpool Pilot Program to Launch in Coordination with STA





Adopted by the STA Board at the February 2025 Board Meeting, the Solano Community College Intercampus Vanpool Pilot Program is a partnership between Solano Community College (SCC) and the STA and is set to launch on April 14, 2025.

In November of 2024, the Solano Community College District (SCCD) asked STA to partner in piloting an Intercampus Vanpool Program to connect the Vacaville, Fairfield, and Vallejo campuses. Providing intercampus transportation is a critical need and one of the major initiatives of the college's three-year Student Equity and Achievement Plan. This initiative will assist students with transportation challenges, allowing them to stay engaged and graduate in a timely manner by providing access to courses at campuses. In addition, the vanpool will facilitate student access to essential resources and participation in extra-curricular activities across campuses.

The pilot program will run Monday through Friday and have two 8passenger vans with wheelchair accessibility that will make a roundtrip from the Vacaville and Vallejo campuses to the Fairfield campus. First and last van pickup times will be posted, and throughout the day, SCC students will be able to access a dashboard to determine van location and plan their rides.

The initial pilot program will continue to run until June 30, 2026.

## Solano County Water Agency accepting entries for Water Awareness Video Contest



The Solano County Water Agency is now accepting entries from Solano County students in grades 6 through 12 and their sponsoring teachers for the Water Agency's 15th annual video contest. Winning entries will receive up to \$1,500.

This year's theme is The Water Cycle: Why We Need to Think Outside the Sink. The contest is challenging students to explore the need for Solano County residents to think globally and act locally in order to conserve water.

Students should create a one-minute public service announcement video explaining how we can all work together to conserve water on a broad scale. In their PSAs, we encourage students to think about all the different ways people, industries, and institutions use water, and to offer creative conservation steps for individuals and our society at-large to take.

This year, the Solano County Water Agency will award prizes of \$1,500 to the first-place video, \$1,000 to the second-place video, and \$500 to the third-place video. Additionally, the winning entry from each school with ten or more submissions will be awarded a \$100 gift card. The three teachers who generate the most student participation in the contest will each win a \$200 gift card.

Entries will be judged by a panel of water efficiency experts and community leaders for content, accuracy, and response to the assigned theme; entertainment value and originality; videography, style and organization; and audio/sound quality.
